

INDIGENOUS CONSULTATION REPORT

1. In order to ensure compliance with the Ontario Energy Board's (the "Board") Environmental guidelines for the Location, Construction and Operation of Hydrocarbon Pipelines and Facilities in Ontario, 7th Edition 2016 (the "Guidelines"), Enbridge Gas Distribution Inc. ("Enbridge") requested that the Ministry of Energy ("MOE") determine if it would delegate the procedural aspects of the duty to consult for the Project to Enbridge. This request was made by way of a letter dated January 19, 2018 and is set out at Attachment 1 to this Exhibit. Subsequently Enbridge updated routing for the Project and in a letter to the MOE dated February 2, 2018 requested that the MOE determine if it would delegate the procedural aspects of duty to consult for the Project to Enbridge based on the new route. This letter is set out at Attachment 2 to this Exhibit. On February 27, 2018, Enbridge received a letter from the MOE which indicated that the MOE did not anticipate any appreciable adverse impacts from this Project to the asserted or established rights of any First Nation or Métis communities. Based on this determination, no duty to consult was triggered and the MOE will not be providing a letter of opinion regarding the sufficiency of consultation. This letter is found at Attachment 3 to this Exhibit.
2. Should new information on the Project become available that indicates a potential to impact Aboriginal and treaty rights, Enbridge will notify the MOE.
3. On March 15, 2018, the Project was launched publicly. Initial study commencement letters and invitations to attend the open houses were mailed to those within the study area. As of the time of the submission of this application, no Indigenous communities have requested engagement on the Project on an interests-basis. In the event that an Indigenous community provides Enbridge with information

indicating a potential adverse impact on this Project on its Aboriginal or Treaty rights, this will be brought to the attention of the MOE with supporting information.

4. At the request of the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation (“MNCFN”), the Ministry of Tourism, Culture and Sport (“MTCS”) has been notifying the Indigenous Community of all Project Information Forms (“PIF”) filed for projects within their traditional territory. On March 6, 2018, Timmins Martelle Heritage Consultants (“TMHC”) received a letter from the Mississaugas of the New Credit First Nation which stated that the Study Areas are located within the traditional territory of the community. The community is a signatory to the Toronto Purchase (Treaty 13), 1805. The community requested that a copy of the draft report and the associated archaeological report be made available for review. On March 21, 2018, Enbridge responded back to the MNCFN in a form of a letter informing them that the Stage 1 archaeological report was not complete but the preliminary results indicate that a Stage 2 may not be required due to the highly urbanized area that has undergone extensive development. Enbridge committed to providing the MNCFN with a final copy of the archaeological report for their information.
5. Enbridge will update the Board of further developments if required.
