If you're planning an outdoor project, call or click to have underground natural gas lines and other utilities located before you start digging.

Nearly 7

Knowing what and where they are will help you prevent serious injury and damage.

Private vs. utility lines

Owned by natural gas, electric and telecommunications companies. Locates are free with a call to Ontario One Call.

Private lines

Any natural gas or other line installed by you or a contractor, such as a line that runs from your gas meter to a pool heater or barbecue, must be marked by a private locate company.





Follow these steps to dig safely

Plan your project

confirm to be sure.

- Gather all details how you'll dig, where you'll dig and how deep.
- Submit a locate request
 Visit OntarioOneCall.ca or call 1-800-400-2255 at least five business days before starting your project. If you're working with a contractor, never assume they have taken care of it. Always
- Wait for underground lines to be marked
 Locators from each utility or telecommunications company
 will come out to mark the location of underground lines on
 your property.
- Respect the marks

 Remember to leave a safe clearance of one metre on either side of the locates. This is called the "tolerance zone."
- Dig slowly and carefully

 If you must dig within the tolerance zone, use a shovel or a spade to first expose the natural gas line by hand. Only then can you use machinery, but never within one metre of the exposed line.
- Backfill slowly

 Make sure the soil is free of rocks and sharp objects, then gradually place it back in around the natural gas line, pressing it gently as you go.
